To Whom It May Concern:

WHEREAS, it has become advisable to close the following waters in the State of Utah to fishing:

That portion of the Jordan River from the Midvale Bridge, below the U. S. Smelter Plant on highway No. 48 to Bingham Canyon, to the Bluffdale Bridge at Bluffdale, Utah,

NOW THEREFORE, I, Newell B. Cook, Fish and Game Commissioner of the State of Utah, by virtue of authority vested in me under Section 30-07, Revised Laws of the State of Utah, 1933, do hereby declare and proclaim the above described waters closed to fishing until June 15, 1936.

May 25, 1936

To Whom it May Concern:

WHEREAS, it has become advisable to permit fishing in the Strawberry Reservoir, Wasatch County, Utah, prior to the regular opening date and to regulate fishing in certain other waters as follows:

NOW THEREFORE, I, Newell B. Cook, Fish and Game Commissioner of the State of Utah, by virtue of the authority vested in me by Section 30-0-7, Revised Laws of Utah, do hereby proclaim and declare that said Strawberry Reservoir, Wasatch County, Utah, shall be and is hereby opened to fishing on the 14th day of June 1936, commencing at 4 a. m.

PROVIDED HOWEVER that the portion of the Strawberry Reservoir within a two-hundred yard radius of the mouth of the Strawberry River and that portion of the Strawberry Reservoir within a two-hundred yard radius from the mouth of the spillway shall remain closed to fishing until 4 a. m. the morning of July 1, 1936.

This proclamation does not include any of the tributaries to the said Strawberry Reservoir. All such tributaries shall remain and are hereby declared closed to fishing the entire year 1936.

PROVIDED FURTHER that the stream running through Yankee Meadows in Iron County shall also open to fishing June 14, 1936.

PROVIDED FURTHER that the following waters in Uintah and Sanpete Counties shall be closed to fishing the entire year 1936:

All of the waters of Francis Creek and Cart Creek in the McKee Draw from the head to Green River;
East Park Reservoir;
All the waters of Little Brush Creek including all head tributaries; and the
South Fork of the Manti Canyon.

WHEREAS, it has become advisable to close the waters of the Strawberry Reservoir in Wasatch County, Utah, to fishing for the remainder of the year 1936,

July 22, 1936.

In the declaring of this open season we have endeavored first to give the various species of game fishes an "even break" with the fishermen and second to serve the wishes of the greatest number of people interested in this activity.

We have had a great deal of correspondence from the Game Protective Associations and other groups as well as many letters and petitions from private individuals across the State, expressing their views as to what should be done relative to the opening of the season and closing of certain waters for numerous reasons. Requests were received asking for the opening date to be declared all the way from May 5 to July 1 and in each case, to a greater or lesser degree, a good reason was given for such desires. After taking into consideration all requests the date of May 16 was chosen and it is to be hoped that water conditions will be favorable at least to bait fishing. Inasmuch as insect life will not be abundant at that time of the year it is evident that fly fishing will not be very satisfactory. However, it is the desire of the most people to be allowed to get out on the stream and the open to enjoy themselves in a recreational way. We hope that this season as formulated will meet with favor as we have considered the desires of the entire State, keeping in mind first and foremost giving adequate protection to the fish themselves.

The date of June 15 was set by the Legislature years ago when our streams were full of Native trout that were in the midst of their spawning during the month of May. We have since introduced Rainbow and German Brown and with the nearly passing of the Native it is self-evident that the condition is no longer prevalent especially when you take into consideration the closing of all waters above the 7,000 foot level—which largely takes care of the spawning grounds of the Native Fish. The Game And Fish Department since 1951 has had an egg exchange for two million eggs per year with the Montana Fish and Game Department in an endeavor to re-establish the Native trout. This work is now beginning to show results in the major streams of the State.

The planting season will only be started as this time as compared with the number of fish to plant. We have better and more equipment with which to plant our fish now and we will endeavor to plant legal size fish as rapidly as possible when the water conditions become suitable after the late spring run-off.

We invite the public to visit our hatcheries and to check our fish tanks in any locality in the planting of fish, as it is our desire to endeavor to serve the fishing public of Utah to the best of our ability with the very limited amount of fishing water and the limited amount of revenue at our disposal for the production of legal size fish.
