A PROCLAMATION

By virtue of the authority vested in me by Section 30-0-7, Revised Laws of Utah, 1933, I, Newell B. Cook, Fish and Game Commissioner of the State of Utah, do hereby proclaim and declare that the Five Spring Holes and the streams for a radius of fifty feet from the outlet of said spring holes, which are located on the shores of Utah Lake, at the point of the mountain near Lincoln Beach, shall be and are hereby declared closed to the angling for or taking of fish during the year 1939.

STATE OF UTAH
FISHING PROCLAMATION
1939

WHEREAS, it has become advisable to permit fishing in certain of the streams, lakes and reservoirs of the State of Utah prior to June 15, 1939,

NOW THEREFORE, I, Newell B. Cook, Fish and Game Commissioner of the State of Utah, by virtue of the authority vested in me by Section 30-0-7, Revised Laws of Utah 1933, do hereby proclaim and declare that all streams, lakes and reservoirs of the State of Utah except as herein below otherwise provided shall be and are hereby proclaimed and declared opened to fishing commencing at 4:00 a. m. Sunday, June 4, 1939.

EXCEPTIONS

The following exceptions shall be in effect in the State of Utah during the year 1939:

BEAVER COUNTY:

Puffer Lake, High-Low Reservoir and La Beron Lake shall remain closed to fishing until June 15, 1939; provided further that Kent's Lake shall close to fishing from July 10 to September 10, due to the fact that the fish taken from this water are not edible during this period. The Minersville Reservoir and all streams below said reservoir shall be opened to fishing for common fish the year around. The Slough known as the Adobe Yard Slough, between the Beaver State Fish Hatchery and a point approximately 300 feet west of the west property line of Kelly's Hatchery shall remain closed to fishing during the entire year of 1939.

CACHE COUNTY:

The following streams and reservoirs in Cache County shall be closed to fishing the entire year of 1939: Right Hand Fork of Logan River; Temple Fork; Beaver Fork; White Pine Creek and Logan River above the point where it junctions with Beaver Creek; the tail race at the Logan City Power Plant in Logan Canyon; Creeper Creek, from the site of Smart's Bungalow at the north of Hay's Canyon to its source; Smithfield Creek from the East Ranch Diversion to its source; the southeast portion of the Hyrum Reservoir for approximately three quarters of a mile from the point where Little Bear empties into said reservoir, as marked and posted on the ground. Provided that all waters west of the Union Pacific Railroad tracks extending from the Utah-Idaho State line through Logan to the Mendon Highway and all waters north of the Mendon Highway west to the Olsen Road shall be open to fishing for common fish the year around.

CARBON COUNTY:

The Scofield Reservoir in Carbon County and Fish Creek below the reservoir shall open to fishing on June 4, 1939, except that the Scofield Reservoir shall be closed for a distance of one hundred yards radius from the mouth of Fish Creek until July 1. Provided further that all tributaries to Scofield Reservoir, except the Gooseberry CCC Fish Pond, which opens on June 4, shall remain closed to fishing until July 1, 1939.

DAGGETT COUNTY:

All the streams, lakes and reservoirs in Daggett County, regardless of altitude, shall remain closed to fishing until July 1, 1939. Provided further that Daggett Lake and Spirit Lake shall remain closed to fishing the entire year of 1939.

DAVIS COUNTY:

Little Lake in Farmington Canyon shall be closed to fishing until July 1, 1939.

DUCHESTER COUNTY:

The following streams and lakes in Duchesne County shall open to fishing on June 4, 1939:

Strawberry River Proper below the Reservoir;

Moon Lake;

The Lakes in Lake Canyon;

Duchesne River below its junction with the West Fork; and the North Fork of the Duchesne up to the Old Mill Bridge above Savage's Ranch;

Rock Creek up to the Forest Bridge above Petersen's Ranch;

Uintah River up to the Big Spring;

Red Creek and Current Creek below the point where the Victory Highway crosses said streams;

All other lakes and streams in the Uintah Mountains in Duchesne County lying above an altitude of 7,000 feet, and Red Creek and Current Creek above the point where the Victory Highway crosses said streams shall be closed to fishing until July 1, 1939.

EMERY COUNTY:

Boulger Creek and Huntington River above its junction with Boulger Creek shall remain closed to fishing until July 1, 1939.

GARFIELD COUNTY:

Panguitch Lake shall open to fishing on June 15, 1939.

Tropic Reservoir and its tributaries; Ipson Creek; Blue Spring Creek and Pine Creek, near Escalante, shall remain closed during the entire year of 1939.

JUAB COUNTY:

The following tributaries to Salt Creek Canyon shall remain closed to fishing during the entire year of 1939: Birch Swamps Stream; Bradley Canyon Stream; the Hop Creek Canyon Stream and Pole Canyon Stream.

KANE COUNTY:

Navajo Lake in Kane County shall remain closed to fishing until June 15, 1939.

MORGAN COUNTY:

The following streams in Morgan County shall remain closed during the entire year of 1939: Stoddard Slough from the Stoddard-Milton Road to its source; and Francis Creek from its junction with Lost Creek to its source.

RICH COUNTY:

Bear Lake and all of its tributaries shall open to fishing on June 4, 1939, and remain open until December 10, 1939.

SALT LAKE COUNTY:

Mill "D" South Fork, tributary to Big Cottonwood Creek; Porter's Fork, in Mill Creek Canyon; City Creek; Mountain Bell Reservoir and stream above said reservoir; Mill Creek and its tributaries between 7th East and 9th East Streets and Little Cottonwood, through Murray City Park only, shall remain closed the entire year of 1939.

SANPETE COUNTY:

Gooseberry CCC Fish Pond and its headwaters above the dam shall open to fishing on June 4. Gooseberry stream below the CCC Pond Dam shall remain closed to fishing until July 1. Provided that all other tributaries to the Scofield Reservoir shall remain closed until July 1, 1939. Provided further that Ferron Reservoir, Willow Lake, Boulger Creek and Huntington River above its junction with Boulger shall remain closed until July 1. Provided that Males Reservoir, near Moroni, shall remain closed the entire year.

SEVIER COUNTY:

Provided that the Fremont River below the Johnston Reservoir for a distance of 300 yards shall remain closed for the entire year of 1939. Fishlake, Johnson Valley Reservoir and Seven-Mile Creek, below the bridge, shall open on June 15 and close at 2 p. m. on September 30, 1939. Provided further that that portion of Fishlake lying within a radius of two hundred and fifty feet from the south of Twin Creek, and Seven-Mile Creek, from the bridge to its source shall remain closed the entire season of 1939.

SUMMIT COUNTY:

Smith and Warehouse Dam and the stream above said dam shall remain closed until July 1. All of the Weber River and its tributaries above its junction with Smith and Warehouse shall remain closed until July 1. All other lakes and streams above an altitude of 7,000 feet in the Uintah Mountains in Summit County shall remain closed until July 1, 1939. The following waters in Summit County shall remain closed the entire year of 1939: Heiner Creek; the Echo Dam for a distance of two hundred and fifty yards above the intake of the spillway and from the needle valve of the dam down stream an approximate distance of 300 yards to a point where said stream joins the old river bed; the Weber River from fifty feet above the crest of the Weber-Provo Canal Diversion Dam to the first County road and bridge below the dam, an approximate distance of 200 yards; and Gilbert Creek, a tributary to Smith's Fork.

TOOELE COUNTY:

Clover Creek for a distance of one-quarter mile down stream from the spring at the CCC camp shall be closed the entire year of 1939.

UTAH COUNTY:

The South Fork of the Provo River shall close to fishing September 30, 1939. It shall be unlawful to fish from the shores or within 200 yards of the

shores of Rock Island in Utah Lake during the period between June 4 and September 1, 1939. Provided further that Shingle Mill Creek in Diamond Fork Canyon and its tributaries above its junction with Hall's Fork shall remain closed to fishing during the entire year of 1939.

UINTAH COUNTY:

All lakes and streams in the Uintah Mountains in Uintah County, lying above an altitude of 7,000 feet, shall be closed to fishing until July 1, 1939. Provided that all the waters of Big Brush Creek between Big Brush Creek Spring and Big Brush Creek Sinks shall remain closed the entire year of 1939. Provided further that the North Fork of Ashley Creek between Trout Creek and Hacking Lake shall remain closed to fishing the entire year of 1939.

WASATCH COUNTY:

The Provo River and its tributaries above the bridge at the west property line of Stewart's Ranch shall remain closed to fishing until July 1. Bench Creek above the Bench Creek road; Red Creek and Current Creek in Wasatch County lying above the point where the Victory Highway crosses said streams shall be closed to fishing until July 1. That portion of Midway Spring Creek running through the Midway State Fish Hatchery property, and Lake Creek, shall remain closed the entire year of 1939.

WAYNE COUNTY:

The lakes and streams on the Boulder and Tadmor Lake Mountains shall remain closed to fishing until June 15, 1939.

WEBER COUNTY:

All waters above the mouth of the narrows of the South Fork of the Ogden River and Causeur Creek and all its tributaries in Weber County, also Wheeler Creek, shall be closed the entire year. Also the spillway at the Pine View Dam, as marked and posted, shall be closed the entire year.

STATE FISH HATCHERIES:

Provided further that all waters within all properties owned or controlled by the State Fish and Game Department for Fish Hatchery purposes shall be closed to fishing the entire year of 1939.

REDUCTION OF BAG LIMITS IN CERTAIN WATERS:

Provided further that in the following waters it shall be lawful for any person duly licensed, subject to regulations as prescribed by law, to catch not more than eight (8) pounds of game fish or not more than twenty (20) game fish in any one day, but if after catching in weight less than eight pounds a fish of more than the required weight to make eight pounds should be caught, such fish may be kept; and that it shall be unlawful to have in possession at any one time more than sixteen (16) pounds of any or several varieties or species of game fish: Navajo, Panguitch, Puffer and Fishlake and all lakes on the Boulder and Thousand Lake Mountains above 7,000 feet; all of the natural lakes and all streams on the Wasatch National Forest above the 7,000 foot level, except the Provo River below the Soapstone Bridge and the Weber River below a point approximately one mile above the South property line of Holiday Park, as marked and posted on the ground.
